There is no doubt that English has become the most global of languages, the lingua franca of international business, science, education, politics and pop music. About three hundred and thirty million people in the world speak English as a native language, as compared with two hundred and sixty million for Spanish, a hundred and fifty million for Portuguese and a little over one hundred million for French. No other language is spoken as an official tongue in more countries, forty-four as against twenty-seven for French, and twenty for Spanish. And none is spoken over a wider area on the globe; two-thirds of scientific papers, seventy percent of the world's mail, ninety percent of what is written on the Internet is in English.
